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## Drymen Community Development Trust

**Drymen Community Development** Trust has had a challenging few months. The community has long expressed a wish to slow traffic in the centre of the village and to have a crossing point on the main road, so in late June we installed a road safety trial that we hoped would meet those aims. The temporary trial uses lines and planters to narrow the road and provide a shorter crossing point between the Spar and the village square. It would be fair to say that the trial has had mixed reviews, with some particularly vocal objections on Facebook. We would like to apologise to those in the community who do not like it.



We held a public meeting in the village hall on 21 August to provide further information about the road safety trial and to respond to questions and comments from the community. The presentation and notes from that meeting, along with an earlier set of FAQs about the trial are available on the Drymen website here:

www.drymen.org/road-safety-trial-faq.

The recently re-formed Drymen Community Council has agreed to undertake an independent survey about the trial to be made available to all members of the community. The results should provide a clear decision on the future of the current road safety trial.

DCDT exists to serve two purposes – to look after the village square on behalf of the village, and to undertake projects that reflect the wishes of the village. We sincerely hope that we can use the current high levels of engagement to identify positive solutions to road safety that have strong community support.

In other news - for some time the Trust has been looking at options to establish



public toilets in the village, and has recently been awarded a grant to undertake a feasibility / design study. This should hopefully put the village in a strong position to apply for a grant to build this much needed facility.

Earlier world predictions of a hot 2023 came to pass. Globally, the June temperature topped the month-average, followed by a blistering July, confirmed to be the hottest month in human history by the three top climate monitoring services: NASA, EU Copernicus and NOAA's National Centers for Environmental Information. The global average sea temperature edged to a new high of 20.96°C, just exceeding the 2016 figure.

The four nations of the UK all produced record June temperatures. In Drymen, we averaged a daytime high of 21.7°C, considerably above 2nd and 3rd places of 21.0°C in 1960 and 20.9°C in 2018. The long term average for the Glasgow area is 18.1°C, so quite an uplift. Despite this, Drymen was a little wetter than expected in part due to a downpour overnight on the 18/19th as the long run of hot days ended. July was dull, cool and very soggy, in fact the 4th wettest compared the Glasgow 60-year data set. August was unremarkable.


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# What's going on in the Hall

## Macmic development Stirling/ Gartness Road

There has been a slight change to the number of houses to be built under the current approved application. The change was approved by LLTNP on 26th June 2023 (LLTNP 2022/0265/75A) – the total number of houses is down to 85, with 12 'low-cost housing' and 30 'affordable housing' units.

The original entrance into the field east of the telephone exchange, has been blocked off with a fence as the exchange ground has been extended. The entrance to the 'temporary' car park which they are supposed to build to replace the existing car park while work is carried out on the first houses, will I assume be even further out the Stirling Road i.e. further away from the centre of the village and shops etc. making life difficult for anyone who is less able-bodied. In addition, I believe the original approved plans show a crossing from that car park to the north side of the road (there is no footpath on the south side past Ardmore Gardens), so everyone parking there to go to Spar will have to cross Stirling Road four times, on a single trip. Perhaps this should be considered in the current discussion on 'road safety trial'.

While I agree cycling is good for the planet and our health, needing a folding bike in the car boot just to get a newspaper and a pint of milk is ridiculous!

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## Drymen Community Council Re-formed

We were delighted to welcome so many of the community to our inaugural meeting on Tuesday 5th September. It was a very positive meeting with interesting and balanced discussions on a variety of topics. Key points discussed and agreed were:

**Road Safety Trial:** this is being implemented by Drymen Community Development Trust (the Trust) who has asked Drymen Community Council (DCC) to undertake an impartial and independent survey of the Trial. The questionnaire is being drafted taking on board feedback given at our first meeting. In addition, we want to ensure the community is involved in this process so two drop in sessions are being held where anyone able can attend to review the draft survey and provide useful feedback. The first of these will already have taken place by the time this Reporter is published. The second **drop in session** will be held in the Village Hall **on Wednesday 27th September between 6-8pm**. Lastly, it was agreed that we would then present the finalised questionnaire back to the community at our next meeting on Tuesday 3rd October.

**Public toilets:** the Trust advised that it has been successful in obtaining a grant to undertake a feasibility study for public toilets in Drymen. In addition to this a member of our community had undertaken some detailed research that may support being able to obtain use of an existing local premise and this will be investigated further.



Hedges: there was consensus in the room that the hedges in a variety of locations substantially overhang the pavements impeding their use safely as



walkways by all. We undertook to carry out a review of hedges across the village to identify all locations where overhanging hedges may be an issue to allow an informed decision to be made on how to resolve.

**Local buses:** a local bus service between Drymen and Balfron was discussed, including the possibility of a community bus. Many options were discussed and it was agreed we would speak to the Trust.

These are just a few examples of what was discussed, full meeting minutes can be found in Drymen Library. We encourage everyone able in our community to come to our next meeting to be part of shaping and supporting what is already a great place to live, work and visit!

## Not your boring school History lessons!

Did you know Glasgow Police force was the oldest force in the UK? Or sonar was developed at Fairlie near Largs? No? Well, these are just two of the six interesting, illustrated talks we have lined up for the History Society's winter meetings (in the Village Hall at 7.30 pm on the fourth Thursday of the month) so, why not come and find out more about these and other topics listed below.

**28 September 2023** - **'Fairlie's secret war'** - Dr John Riddell - The Royal Navy's Anti-Submarine Experimental Establishment moved from Portland to the boatyard in Fairlie during WWII and was prominent in the development of Sonar (originally known as Asdic) which helped in the battle against Uboats and reduced the losses of Allied ships.

**26 October 2023 -'It all started with Rob Roy' -** James Kennedy, Chair of Loch Ard Heritage Society – an illustrated talk on film making in the Trossachs, 1911-1953. Come and see Hollywood's idea of the famous cateran and hear the accounts of local people who served as extras.

**23 November 2023** - 'History of Glasgow Police, the oldest Police force in the UK' - Alastair Dinsmor, Curator of the Glasgow Police Museum in Bell Street, Glasgow, - we hope to follow up the talk with a later visit to the Museum for interested members.

**25 January 2024 - 'The legacy of Robert Burns'** - an illustrated talk by Len Murray, very well-known Glasgow lawyer and Burns expert.

22 February 2024 – 'The history of Duntreath Castle and Estate' – Eddie Edmonstone.

**28 March 2024** – **'Ben Lomond; history of the mountain and surrounding area'** – Alistair Eckersall of National Trust for Scotland.

**25 April 2024 – Members' Night** – pre-meeting cheese, wine, and soft drinks at 7pm followed by short talks by members and the annual AGM.

Membership is £10 per year (includes entry to all meetings), and visitors are welcome (£3 per lecture). We also maintain an 'archive' of articles and photographs of local interest which can be viewed in the Library - the Archives list can be accessed via our web site, <u>www.drymen-history.org.uk</u>. We have a strong record of publishing booklets of local history interest, available to buy in the Library or direct from the Society. Titles include 'The History of Croftamie School', 'Buchanan Castle in wartime', 'The rise and decline of the railways in Drymen' and 'The poems of Sam Henry, the Drymen poet'.

## Blink and you'll miss them!

Quite a few locals turned out to the bypass on 12<sup>th</sup> and 13th August as World Championship cyclists (Men's U23 and Elite/ U23 Women) paid a fleeting visit as they cycled from Balloch to Glasgow via Balfron, Fintry and the Crow Road - 169km (105 miles) for men and 154 km (96 miles for women). Locals were joined on the day by visitors from across the world, many of whom had relatives or friends competing.

Both races were completed without incident, unlike the Men's Road Race which was stopped near Carron Reservoir for nearly an hour by protesters on the road. For seasoned world class riders this was a chance to just chat to their friends in other teams, with one taking the opportunity to use the bathroom facility of a nearby house – it's not known whether the householder now has a commemorative plaque in the little room!









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
