

Try 'Curling' – in the Village Hall?

Drymen Curling Club are holding an "Open Evening" in the Village Hall on Tuesday 19th March 7pm – 8.30pm. You might ask "how does this relate to curling on ice?". OK, we won't be on ice! We do, however, have a kit that will allow you to get a sense of what is involved in the addictive game of Curling. **Drop in anytime and meet the members.**

The Club was formed in 1830 and almost had an ice rink built by Sir Hugh Fraser around 1978, on the ground now occupied by Winnock Court. We have members from Gartocharn, Croftamie, Drymen and Stirling and we usually curl at the Ice Rink in the Peak, Stirling. We have good car share arrangements amongst the members, and it is possible to curl as often or as little as you like. For regular curlers the games tend to be on a Tuesday evening.

Robin Hood Pantomime



It was a mild winter. December was 50% wetter than average and sustained high winds for 24 hours through 21st -22nd brought some trees down in the surrounding area.

The monthly mean temperature was up by 1° C but, even so, a little snow lay on the 30th.

January was slightly cooler than average. A run of 14 frosts in a row, including three under -8°C, was more than offset by the effect of a warm airstream from the Azores towards the end of the month when Kinlochewe, in Wester Ross, saw the mercury rocket to 19.6°C on the 28th, providing a January record for the UK.

February was a very warm month with daily maximums up nearly 2°C. Great news for amphibians! By the middle of the month, daytime temperatures were consistently in double figures and on the 28th, after 3mm of rain and the magic after-dark temperature of 6°C, conditions were perfect for the first of the Spring frog and toad migrations. The perilous nocturnal journey across the Drymen to Balmaha road saw hundreds flattened, but the smorgasbord would be cleaned up by morning as the crows, magpies, jays, and foxes moved in.






