Frances Lander – traffic on Stirling Road is too fast. More speed limit signs required. AR – MacMic to install two zebra crossings, which will hopefully slow traffic.

5.	UPDATE FROM DRYMEN COMMUNITY COUNCIL (DCC) Andrew Richardson (AR) from DCC gave a brief overview of the role of DCC and a summary of their activities over the year:	
	DCC is the statutory consultee representing Drymen and as such liaises with the National Park Authority, Stirling Council, the police and other similar bodies. It aims to represent the village and help locals with any relevant issues. The DCC also sit on the East Loch Lomond Visitor Management Group (ELLVMG). DCC income comes primarily from the Gala Day (not held this year due to lack of support) and small budget from Stirling Council.	
	 Examples of recent work include: Stopping transatlantic flights flying over LLTNP. Insuring community assets. Working with Stirling Council to identify potholes, change the bin collection day from Sunday to Thursday, closing Balfunning Lane and limiting access and speed on Balfunning Road. 	
	DCC is delighted to be working with DCDT on improving the village square and securing public toilets for the village. DCC are always looking for additional councillors - their next meeting is on Tuesday 6 September at 7.30.	
	Thanks to AR for the update.	
6.	UPDATE FROM DRYMEN HERITAGE Unfortunately, Carol Hemfrey was unable to attend the meeting, but provided this summary which RB read out:	
	This year seems to have been a very successful/memorable one with co-operation with the parent Trust in the Village Heritage project, culminating in the publication of the Drymen Heritage Trail leaflet and its related audio links and the board in the square. Very special thanks go to Katy Gibb and colleagues who brought a long- standing Drymen Heritage aim to fruition. Unfortunately, the intended transfer of research files to the dedicated filing cabinet in the library's local history room, which has been delayed by the project-planner's ill health, has been set back even further by the recent collapse of the library ceiling. However, it is hoped that it can still be retrieved at some point and temporarily relocated.	
	Bizarrely, a recent attempt to breathe new life into the 40-year-old Drymen and District Local History Society included an ill-conceived proposed usurpation of the 13- year-old Drymen Heritage name. Fortunately, this occurred between the project planner's two spells in hospital and was robustly rebuffed. The obviously-forgotten previous sporadic liaison will, however, still be maintained for mutual benefit.	
	And finally – the usual annual plea. All members of the Trust are automatic members of Drymen Heritage, with no further 'subs'. If anyone has been impressed by the depth of village history revealed in the Heritage Trail, and would like to delve even deeper, please get in contact. There are lots of different tasks available, and you don't have to be academically minded, just interested in the fabric (buildings) and social (people) aspects of our community. 7.	TREASURER'S REPORT AND APPROVAL OF AUDITED ACCOUNTS AND APPOINTMENT OF AUDITOR
	Ewan Mackay was unable to attend the meeting as he had Covid.
	Richard Boddington summarised the financial activity for tax year 2020/2021. The
	Financial review from the accounts is presented here:
	The 2021/22 financial year has been very positive for the Trust the membership has
	continued to rise over the year with the membership numbers standing at 146, and
	with a move to reminding members to renew on a rolling basis we have spread the
	workload for managing the membership.
	Quantific secures of the firm with the secure have needed at the CEOL in securit funding
	Over the course of the financial year, we have received circa £50k in grant funding.
	We have also received Support from connecting Scotland who now provide the Mifi
	connections for the digital inclusion project until Dec 2023. With the return of Piping
	in the Square, a good membership and gift aid we have had a good non-grant income
	of £2,078.
	Our main Expenses through the year have been:
	1. The repairs to the Parking bays in May 2021 (£20,431 at completion)
	2. The Renovations to the Bus shelter, which is nearing completion (£21,835)
	3. The Historical Trail, also nearing completion (£1,452)
	4. The Website Project (£1,567) completed June 2021
	5. The Installation of Bike Stands in the Square (£1,545)
	Over the course of the year, we have seen increases in both the Restricted and
	Unrestricted funds, due to the grant funding received, piping in the Square and the
	good membership numbers, however it is worth noting at this point that due to
	market conditions during 2021 the bus shelter project is expected to over spend by
	about £3,000 which will have a significant impact on our unrestricted funds in the
	next accounting period. It is also worth noting that in the course of the completing the
	Bus shelter project, a payment was made to a hacker when dealing with one of the
	suppliers, this was resolved as the hack was into the supplier email system and they
	accepted responsibility and honoured the agreement, supplying the equipment.
	The Trust is very grateful to all of the organisations which have provided funding this
	year, without which the Trust could not carry out its activities.
	Approval of the accounts was proposed by David Mackie and seconded by Paul
	Rybarczyk.
	Approval of the ongoing appointment of the auditors (Baxter Accounting & Tax
	Services) was proposed by Paul Saunders and seconded by Richard Boddington after
	the meeting.
	ITEM 8: PROPOSAL TO INCREASE THE ANNUAL MEMBERSHIP FEES
8.	DM proposed that the membership fees be increased as follows, and that a new
	option of life membership be offered to individuals who would like to make a larger
	donation to the funds of the DCDT:
	Individual membership increase from £6 to £10
	Couple membership increase from £10 to £15
	New life membership - £250
	The proposal was put to the members who voted unanimously to support the
	changes.
