Drymen (pronounced Drimmen) is the gateway to East Loch Lomond. In the late 18th century Drymen had an important role as a stopover for Highland cattle drovers.



After the arrival of the railways in the mid 19th century, Drymen became a small market village supplying goods and services to the Duke of Montrose at Buchanan Castle.

Drymen is now a thriving tourist centre with hotels and pubs, cafes and restaurants catering for the many visitors who pass through the village. The famous West Highland Way skirts the edge of the village, and the Rob Roy Way starts in Drymen and heads to Pitlochry in Perthshire.

National Cycle Route 7 passes through the village, and the John Muir Trail runs just to the south of Drymen.

Horses are regularly seen being ridden through the village, and you can sail on Loch Lomond from nearby at Balmaha.

Other attractions close by are the Cashel Forest reserve just north of Balmaha, and the Queen Elizabeth Forest Park. Drymen is therefore the perfect place to visit for those who enjoy the outdoors.
